Reflection for November 19



"It all begins with Gratitude," says Guillermo Vasquez, the head of the Bay Area nonprofit Indigenous Permaculture. "I give thanks one, two, three times to our creators and makers for everything." This has been the attitude and action of Indigenous Permaculture since its creation in 2002. The idea behind this project is to form partnerships with local communities and indigenous peoples as a part of the "obligation to bring in Mother Earth's way of thinking" to all systems, Guillermo reports from a yellow flowering field of mustard, groundcover in the Bay Area's East Bay.

"We are all connected," he continues. "We empower low-income peoples to understand and respond directly to how food, nutrition, health, and land are intertwined." IP is more than a food production and gardening program, although the food they produce does provide free vegetables to local food pantries and other distribution sites. Guillermo is most interested in seeing how the connection between creation and the creator are formed through partnership with the land and the cycles of the Earth. He operates with an idea of Tiguanceguite, or, working together. "Always together, never out of alignment."

"It is all related," he explained, "food, energy, water, community."

Whether in rural or urban environments, permaculture, also known as biointensive polyculture, is a blend of traditional farming techniques that help people grow food while conserving water, land, and energy. It is a holistic way of examining gardening and the world, a process Guillermo calls cosmovision. When we share our most sacred meal, we are giving thanks for a system rooted in an ancient

abundance, blessing upon blessing. We honor the life of the created land and the many lives who have touched it, sown, reaped, and shared its increase with a hungry world.

St Thomas joins Angel Tree this Christmas

"Did you know one in 49 children has a parent in prison? At Christmas, the emotional pain of a loved one's incarceration grows even more intense; the distance is felt by children and parents alike. Prison Fellowship Angel Tree gives incarcerated parents a way to provide a Christmas gift and a personal message as a tangible representation of their love." ~ Prison Fellowship Angel Tree

St Thomas is joining with Angel Tree in the unique opportunity to minister to families in our community. This drive continues today—there is a list at the entrance of the church to inspire volunteers to sign up to provide gifts to the children whose dad or mom is in jail or in prison. Like last year, we will be provided with the names and ages of the children in a family (typically 2, 3, or 4 children per family, and we would choose a family). Buy the gifts, pack them, and bring them to church the week of December 10-15. The caretakers for the children will come to St Thomas on Saturday, December 16 in the morning to pick them up.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Campus Security There has been illicit, dangerous and disrespectful activity in our parking lot. This has become a problem for our staff and has raised neighbor complaints. The vestry has initiated installation of a bollard-and-chain set-up at our entrance driveways to deter these activities. The chain will be secured by a padlock keyed to our campus keys so that any authorized keyholder will be able to unlock and lock up after access. In addition, street parking will always be available to anyone needing to make a quick stop on campus at a time when the parking lot is locked up (when no specific event has been scheduled). 
