The First Lesson: 1 Samuel 15:34-16:13

Samuel went to Ramah; and Saul went up to his house in Gibeah of Saul. Samuel did not see Saul again until the day of his death, but Samuel grieved over Saul. And the Lord was sorry that he had made Saul king over Israel.

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons." Samuel said, "How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me." And the Lord said, "Take a heifer with you, and say, 'I have come to sacrifice to the Lord.' Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you." Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, "Do you come peaceably?" He said, "Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice." And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, "Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord." But the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." Then Jesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel. He said, "Neither has the Lord chosen this one." Then Jesse made Shammah pass by. And he said, "Neither has the Lord chosen this one." Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and

Samuel said to Jesse, "The Lord has not chosen any of these." Samuel said to Jesse, "Are all your sons here?" And he said, "There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep." And Samuel said to Jesse, "Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here." He sent and brought him in. Now he was ruddy, and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome. The Lord said, "Rise and anoint him; for this is the one." Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward. Samuel then set out and went to Ramah.



The Epistle: 2 Corinthians 5:6-17

We are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord-- for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!



The Gospel Mark 4:26-34

Gospeler: The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ

according to Mark

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ

Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

Today in the Parish

Introductions to Lectionary Readings for proper 6 (track 1), year B

from Sundays and Seasons

1 Samuel 15:3—16:13

Reading semicontinuously through 1 Samuel, we come to the story of Samuel's countercultural choice of David, who is the youngest son, rather than the firstborn son of nobility, to be a better king than was Saul. Part of the purpose behind these stories is to present the Davidic monarchy as divinely established. The description of David as a shepherd connects him both to Israel's nomadic past and to ancient Near Eastern metaphors of the king as a shepherd. Christians have used the story of the anointing of David as a precursor of the Spirit anointing Jesus at his baptism, and many Christians anoint with oil in

the ritual of baptism, in which all believers are granted the Spirit of God. That David is the youngest son can link with the image of the mustard bush, God using the lowest in surprising ways.

2 Corinthians 5:6-10 [11-13] 14-17

This complex passage written by Paul sometime in the 50s CE to the Christians in Corinth includes several religious worldviews. (1) Being "in the body" (v. 8) indicates the growing influence of the Greco-Roman philosophical proposal about body and soul in Jewish and early Christian belief. (2) There will be a final judgment at the eschaton (v. 10). (3) The death of Christ is important not as a single past historical event but as the archetypal transformation for all believers (v. 14). The resurrection is also a present event; we are new creations now (v. 17). These disparate ideas have not yet been integrated into a single theological position

Mark 4:26-34

According to the Gospel of Mark, Jesus preached not so much detailed allegories as enigmatic parables—short metaphoric depictions—which in their very hiddenness, like the cross itself, are pictures of the kingdom of God that his ministry inaugurated. In the parable of the sown seed, the farmer is inactive although the seed grows, its process a mystery. Rabbinical writings also referred to the small size of the mustard seed; the mustard bush is several feet in size and was cultivated for flavoring. Dying annually, it is only paradoxically a tree of life. The tree of life housing all the birds of the air was a common symbol for the monarch or the kingdom in ancient Near Eastern art and literature. The kingdom of God is Mark's language for God's presence and activity here on earth.







Zooming in Men's Spiritual Growth Group




